

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# A Note on using these materials

I would personally like to thank you for your decision to guide young children to know Christ. As you look through these materials, you will find a teacher page that breaks down the 3 main points of the lesson. You will also find copies of the lessons which are numbered and include: An Introduction, Questions, and room for the children to write a small reflection on how they put God's word to practice. There are 46 lessons in this book which covers an entire year's worth of Bible study among the Gospels and Epistles. Ultimately, it is to your superb judgment on how the lessons are paced throughout the year. Feel free to make copies or ask questions about the materials that have been prepared for you. And as always, stay blessed, be prayerful, and have fun serving God!

### INTRODUCTION TO THE BOOK OF ACTS ACTIVITY AND LESSON

These are some ideas to introduce Acts to your class.

<u>Memory Verse:</u> Acts 1:8 (NIV) "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

As a way to teach the verse draw a large circle on the board with 2 smaller circles inside the large circle. On the center smaller circle talk to the students about what Jesus meant when He told them to be His witnesses in Jerusalem. Use a map (if available) to point out the area mentioned in the verse. (Jerusalem is where the apostles lived.) Place the name of the city or town your church is located in the center circle. Explain that Judea and Samaria were surrounding areas to Jerusalem. In the second circle have a student write the name of the state they are in and some surrounding states. To the ends of the earth would be outside the surrounding states to other countries around the world. Have students write in the 3rd circles some names of countries.

These 3 circles make me think of what happens when you throw a stone in a lake or pond. There is a ripple effect that happens because the rock hit the water. It's the same with the message of the Gospel. When you and I take that message to others there is a ripple effect that takes place. As you share with others and they believe in Jesus and they share with others, the circle keeps growing.

### **Teacher Preparation**:

Prepare arrow road signs from construction paper. Label the signs with the words: Luke, Theophilus, The Acts of the Apostles, Works/deeds, Apostles, Witnesses, Power, Holy Spirit, Salvation and Persecution. (The words are underlined in the lesson as a cue to know when to put the sign on the board. As I prepared to teach this overview I envisioned our class taking a trip through the Book of Acts. The 'road signs' were a way to focus on particular aspects of the Book of Acts that we would be focusing on in this lesson to prepare them for our study through the Book of Acts.

To enable students to participate by reading verses throughout the lesson prepare slips of paper (I used construction paper) with Scripture references for the words: Power, Holy Spirit, Salvation and Persecution (you will find those references in the lesson). I used four envelopes labeled Power, Holy Spirit, Salvation and Persecution and place the corresponding verses in the envelopes. Before teaching the lesson ask children who are willing to read Scripture references to take a verse and find it in their Bible using the slip of paper as a book mark so they will be prepared to read their verse when it is time during the Bible lesson.

### BIBLE LOSSON: A JOURNEY THROUGH ACTS 1-9

### Let's turn in our Bibles to Acts 1.

This morning we are beginning a new journey in our class. We are going to be traveling through the Book of Acts. As we take this trip together we will witness some amazing things. As we study and learn together we will learn how we can live powerful lives like the believers we will be learning about. For the next few weeks we will be reading from chapters 1-9 of Acts and learning about believers in the early church.

Before we begin let's discover who the author of Acts is. Let's turn to Acts 1:1. Does this verse name the author? No, it names who the author was writing to. What is the person's name that the author was writing to? (Theophilus-One who loves God) In order to learn who the author is of this book let's turn to another passage in Scripture that is addressed to Theophilus. (Luke 1:1-4) Do you have a better idea now who the author of Acts is? (Luke) Luke tells us why he wrote the Book of Luke in verse 4. Acts is a sequel to the Book of Luke. How many of you have read a book by an author who wrote more than one book in his/her series. (Have an example to show them. I have read the Left Behind Series by Tim Lahaye and Jerry B. Jenkins. This is the first book in the series (Left Behind) and I also have brought the second in the series (Tribulation Force). Acts is a continuation of the Book of Luke teaching us the events that took place after Jesus returned to heaven.

Does anyone know what kind of job Luke had? (Allow students to answer.) Luke was a doctor. It's very important to back up statements we make about people from the Bible. Does anyone know where we would find that Luke is a doctor? (Colossians 4:14)

When Luke wrote the Book of Acts he didn't write the book in the English language. Does anyone want to guess what language Luke wrote? Luke wrote in Greek. The Greek title for the Book of Acts (Praxeis Apostolon) when translated into English means The Acts of the Apostles. This sequel that Luke has written will show us the works or deeds that the Apostles did as they obeyed Jesus and went into the world sharing the Good News after He returned to Heaven. The Apostles are 12 men chosen by Jesus to take the Gospel to all nations.

Each week as we read and learn from the Book of Acts, Luke will be the one who shares what he has seen and heard. A person who shares what they have seen is called a witness. That word brings us to our memory verse for this morning. This verse is also the key verse for the entire book of Acts.

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." –Acts 1:8

When you are on a road trip and start getting hungry what signs do you look for? (Allow students to answer.) As we journey through the Book of Acts, words from this key verse will stand out all along the way. These words will be like road signs we see as we travel together.

<u>Power:</u> What does the word power mean? The Ability to do or act; capability of doing or accomplishing something; The possession of control or command over others; authority; ascendancy (Dictionary.com) Some verses that talk about power in the chapters we will be studying the next 12 weeks are: (Have students with the verses read them as you call them out. Acts 3:12, Acts 4:33, Acts 6:8 and Acts 9:22.) The power found in these verses came from God in the form of the Holy Spirit. That's our next road sign that we will continually see throughout the Book of Acts.

<u>Holy Spirit</u>: The Holy Spirit is the 3rd person of the Trinity. The Trinity is made up of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. The Father, Son and the Holy Spirit are equally God with different jobs. After Jesus went back to Heaven the Holy Spirit came and empowered the believers to do the work that Jesus told them to do. (Acts 2:38; 4:31; 5:32; 6:5; 9:31)

While God the Son, Jesus is in heaven with God the Father, God the Holy Spirit gives power to those who believe in Him. He gives them power to have courage and boldness to share with others the salvation message.

The next road sign we will see is <u>Salvation</u>. Salvation means be saved from your sins. In the book of acts we will see many people believe in the Lord Jesus and be saved. (Acts 2:41, 4:12 and 5:14) There will be an explosion of faith in people because the Apostles obeyed Jesus. As they were empowered by the Holy Spirit they shared the Good News with many people and as a result many were saved from their sins.

As we see many people saved in Acts, we will also see the apostles persecuted for their obedience to Christ.

The final road sign we are going to discuss this morning is <u>Persecution</u>. What does the word persecute mean? To persecute means to harass, or trouble someone with hurtful methods. Some examples we will see in Acts are found in Acts 5:17-18 (Arrested and imprisoned), 7:54-58 (stoned to death), and 8:1. We have an exciting journey before us! Each week as we see how the apostles served the Lord Jesus I pray that we would serve Him more in our own lives. The power that the Holy Spirit gave to the apostles is available to each one of us who has been saved. As we walk with Jesus each day may we see the Holy Spirit's power working in our lives helping us to be more like Jesus and being obedient to the command He gave us in Acts 1:8.

### KGMGM GAGLIOUS

A way to review the lesson is to take the arrow signs and turn them face down on the ground. As students volunteer to choose an arrow they play a game like Jeopardy and answer with a question. (Example: A student chooses Luke. They answer and say, "Who is the author of Acts?")

If you prefer to play another game here are some review questions you may want to use:

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# WITNESSES OF THE RISEN CHRISTI

hat do you get excited to tell others about? What do you like to share with others? Have you ever been chosen to share something or speak for a group?

The book of Acts was written by Luke. It continues the story of Jesus and his disciples after Jesus rose from the dead. Acts tells how the work begun by Jesus was carried on by his disciples through the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit. It tells how the Christian church was formed and how it spread. beginning in Jerusalem (1-7), it spread to all Judea and Samaria (8-12), and to the ends of the earth (13-28). In today's study the risen Jesus appears to his disciples and promises them the gift of the Holy Spirit. He also gives them a command to be his witnesses by the power of the Holy Spirit. Let's learn what it means to be a witness of Jesus.

Read verse 3. What did Jesus do after his suffering and before his ascension? Read verses 4 and 5. What was Jesus' command and promise? What is "the Holy Spirit"? Why did the disciples need the Holy Spirit".
Read verse 6. What was the disciples hope? What was wrong about this? Do you ever feel that you hopes and dreams get in the way of God's plan?
Read verses 7-8. What was God's plan for them? What does it mean to be a witness? Could they do thi mission on their own? How would God give them the power to do it? How does God give us power to do his work?
Read verse 9. Why did Jesus leave them instead of staying to help them? (think about verse 8) Read verses 10-11. What was the angel's promise?

Application: Who can you begin witnessing to this week? Do you believe that you can?

Teachers Sheet Acts 1:1-11 Key Verse: 1:8

- 1. This passage gives us a unique glimpse into the time after Jesus' death and before his ascension that is not found anywhere else. Jesus showed himself to his disciples and many others as seen in 1 Corinthians 15:3-7. He gave them instructions, he presented himself to the apostles and gave many convincing proofs, he appeared for 40days and spoke about the kingdom of God. Then he told them not to leave Jerusalem—which was a very hard command because they were currently terrified hiding in an upper room with the door locked, for disciples of Jesus Jerusalem was the most dangerous place to stay. But they were to wait for the gift the Father promised, which Jesus spoke to them about—see John 14:16,26;16:13-15: The Holy Spirit.
- The Holy Spirit is somewhat mysterious and may not be really defined in children's minds, so this is a good chance to discuss the work and role of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit never appears as a person, but its work is seen everywhere. In John 3 Jesus described it like the wind, which we cannot see but the effects of which can be seen all around us. So it is with the Holy Spirit. Whenever a person feels the pull to believe, to repent, to do some good thing, feels inspired in a good way, is moved to do the right thing, overcomes temptation, is prompted to pray, receives an answer from God, is prompted to read or accept a verse, feels called to a mission field, is prompted to talk to a person about Jesus or just comfort or help them, understands a passage of scripture, finds words to say when witnessing to others, finds words to say when preaching or defending their faith, finds love for an enemy, forgives miraculously, finds faith in an impossible situation and a multitude of other situations all these are the work of the Holy Spirit. He cannot be seen but he is literally everywhere in the life of faith. What is more having the Spirit is the sign that we are a true believer (Eph 1:13). The Spirit of God in us is all the power of God living inside our little body, therefore it is impossible for a true believer not to change. Hence there is the fruit of the Spirit (Gal 5:22-23). For all these reasons and more the Holy Spirit is called the Advocate that is helper and he IS a help indeed.
- Humanly they were a bunch of terrified nobodies, who had abandoned Jesus at his arrest. They were hiding in an upper room with the door locked, with no idea what to do or how to do it. The task Jesus was giving them was impossible for them. The work God gives to any of us seems too big for us. When God says to our kids, "go share you faith at your school" or "invite your friend to church" they think, "there's no way I can do that, I don't know how" but actually it is the Holy Spirit who does it, not them.
- 2. All the Jews were expecting Jesus to restore the kingdom of Israel (Luke 19:11). From their history, whenever they cried out to God and God raised up a rescuer, the nation was restored. Especially fond in their hearts was king David. They also had the prophecies of the Messiah that said he would rule the nations with an everlasting kingdom, but misunderstood the meaning, and also confused prophecies of his second coming with those of his first. As such, for many Jesus wasn't the Messiah they were looking for. In their worldly dream they didn't want a Messiah like Jesus. However, Jesus' kingdom is not physical but spiritual. We sometimes want an earthly kingdom too, full of only Christians, with perfect laws and perfect morality and we can be in paradise here on earth. But such a kingdom would make us not want to leave this world and we would not want the kingdom. Kids

also can get distracted by all the fun of this world and many have said, "I think heaven would be boring..." because they think of how we tell them not to play video games, don't watch too much TV, spend more time practicing, studying, read your Bible, write your testimony, and they think that this world is much better. They don't want a kingdom to come, they want to make this world a better place and live here forever. We have to be careful about putting too much hope in this world, that we miss our real destination.

- 3. Jesus doesn't rebuke them, but gives them his vision for them. "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." They would be witnesses. Witnesses are very powerful. Hearsay is useless in a court but an eye witness is very powerful. Uniquely, the Apostles had actually heard and seen Jesus, because of this and the anointing of the Spirit that opened their mind to the scriptures (Luke 24:45), the Apostles have unique authority to tell what happened, to write the Gospels, to teach the word and interpret scripture as they did in the New Testament. We should know that their witness is absolutely accurate and trustworthy. When someone is a witness to something, they have an obligation to tell others. If we witness a car crash, we have an obligation to stay and tell the police what we saw. If we witnessed a crime we have an obligation to call the police and report it. If we see bullying in school or a kid doing something wrong or dangerous, we have an obligation to tell a teacher about it—it may seem scary to witness because we think something may happen to us, but we have a responsibility. In the same way, if we were in a sinking ship and found the last remaining lifeboat we could not selfishly get in and abandon everyone else, we have to tell everyone there is a way to be saved. As those who know the way to be saved, we have an obligation to be witnesses of what we know, what we have seen and heard. We haven't seen Jesus in the flesh like the Apostles but we've seen lives changed, we've seen prayers answered, we seen hope restored, we've seen sins overcome and we have a responsibility to spread that news so others can be saved as well. As witnesses we must come forward and not let all our classmates be condemned to hell we may be the only Christian our classmates ever meet. We don't need to be experts just be a witness and tell what you know, what you've seen and heard. Know that when you witness, it is not just you speaking but the Holy Spirit will help you to have words.
- As you grow and overcome your fear, you can begin to understand God's heart. Actually, it is hard for us even to love the kids in our class, but what about our whole school, what about our city, our state, our country, our world. God loves all of them and he really wants to save them, he really wants other people to feel the way he does and go to the ends of the earth. As we begin to grow, we can start to love others and begin to pray to go. When we pray like this, God will reveal where he wants to send us. We must follow the leading of the Spirit in our lives and be willing to obey Jesus' world mission command.
- 4. It seems that it would be more effective for Jesus to stay and evangelize the whole world by himself, while we sit back lounging. In actuality, it is God who does the work of reaching souls and saving them but he chooses to work through us. He had to go in order that he may send the Spirit and prepare a place for them see John 16:7, John 14:3. Even though Jesus has left physically however, he is actually always with those who believe in him. What is more in the same way he left, he will come again. However, he will not come as a savior again but as a judge. So we wait in expectation for his return but his return also gives us a strong sense of urgency to spread the message. Jesus will return and at that time it will be too late. How many can we save before it is too late? How many can we witness to? How many can we love and give a good influence to? Jesus' certain coming should motivate us to tell the world the message of salivation

- ❖ Jesus taught us where any two of us agree on anything, in his name, it will be done for us. Jesus showed us that united prayer is more powerful than personal prayer. To unite in prayer, we have to all agree. We have to humble ourselves and love one another. We share together and find inspiration and as we get together God gives us wisdom that we could not find on our own. God wants us to be in community in his name here, as it will be in heaven. We need to do this often.
- ❖ In prayer, God speaks in many ways. Often, he brings a verse to mind as he did with Peter (which is why it is good to have them hidden away in our heart). Sometimes he speaks directly. Many kids experience that he gives dreams. One of the most clear ways he gives us direction is opening and shutting doors. We don't need to sit around and wait for an answer, Jesus said that whatever we've asked for in prayer believe you have received it; so, we step out in faith and try one way or another and he will make it clear to us which way to go through success and failure.
- ❖ One of the great worries of the kids is that they will screw up and choose the wrong way and be doomed for not choosing God's way. If they have prayed in faith and are truly surrendered to God, God will make it impossible for them to go the wrong way. But if he leaves several doors open, then they should just go and God will bless the way they take. In the casting of the lots, really God could have blessed either man they chose, it doesn't really matter. If they choose one High school or another, either could be God's will and he will bless wherever they go—they cannot choose wrong before a sovereign God.

### ACTIVITY: JOIN TOGETHER IN PRAYER

Have the entire class each share their prayer topics that they have had for a long time or that are urgent. Then pray all together in one voice for each of them.

Make a prayer box for the class. Have each write down their prayer topic for the week and their name and put them in each week. Once a month open the box and see if God has answered.

Jesus promised the Apostles that he would send the Holy Spirit to them and that they would be his witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. This passage tells us about the day the Holy Spirit came as Jesus had promised. Many wonders occurred that day. Let's think about that day and how God began to use his disciples as his witnesses. God sends the Holy Spirit to us to do his work. As we review this passage lets pray that the Holy Spirit work may also in us.

Read verses 2-4. Describe what happened as the disciples were together that day. What did the Holy Spirit enable them to do?
Read verse 5. Who had come to Jerusalem to celebrate the Pentecost (refer to a map looking at 9-11) How was the Holy Spirit helping them to carry out their mission?
Read verses 6-8. What did the people hear when each listened to the Apostles? Read verse 11. Wha were the Apostles declaring? How was this possible?
Think back to Jesus' ascension, what was their mission from Jesus (Acts 1:8)? Could they do this impossible mission on their own? Now with the Holy Spirit was it possible to do this mission?

Acts 2:13-42 Key Verse: 2:23,24

o you like **public speaking**? Have you ever given a **speech** before? Were you **scared**? Were you **excited**? Are you good at **convincing** others of your point?

This passage contains Peter's message to the crowds that were gathered at the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. His message can be divided into two parts. First he explains that what was happening was a fulfillment of Scripture. Second he spoke about Jesus; his death and resurrection and ascension into heaven. With the help of the Holy Spirit, Peter encouraged others to believe in Jesus. Peter wanted to help them have the right view of God, and Jesus. Let's learn from Peter's message today.

# Read verses 16-21 and 33. How did Peter explain the amazing behavior of the Apostles? How did Peter become such a Bible scholar and so brave (look at Luke 24:45 and John 14:26)? What happens when you receive the Holy Spirit? Read verses 22-23. Who is responsible for the death of Jesus? Read verse 24. How did God show his power and love to Jesus? Why did Jesus die? Why did God raise him to life? Read verses 32-33. Where is Jesus now? Read 36-37. How did the people respond? Read verse 38. What must we and all sinners, who crucified Jesus by our sins, do to be saved? Read verse 41. How many were saved that day?

Application: What is your response to Peter's message? Do you want the gift of the Holy Spirit?

# JOSUS IS LORD AND CHRIST

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Acts 2:13-42

Key Verse: 2:23,24

The focus of this passage should be helping children to accept that they are personally responsible for the death of Jesus because of their sins. At some point in the Bible study ask them this: "If you lived in the time of Jesus and somehow their was a horrible disease that killed everyone on earth except for our class, would Jesus still die on the cross just for us? Yes." Then ask: "Do you want your sins forgiven? Yes. Do you want to go to hell? No. Do you want to be able to go to heaven? Yes. What is the only way you can have your sins forgiven and go to God's kingdom? If Jesus dies on the cross for you. Then what would our class have to do to Jesus to be forgiven and go the kingdom of God? We would have to whip him, flog him, press the crown of thorns into his head, beat him half to death, make him carry his cross, nail him to it with nine inch long nails and raise him up into the air on it, give him a sponge with winevinegar, mock him, spit on him, and wait for him to die and then pierce his side, take him down and bury him in Joseph's tomb, seal it and leave him there." All this is necessary for our salvation because all of it is in scripture. We wouldn't want to do it, but unless we do it, we could not be saved. Consider it, it wasn't the nails that held Jesus to the cross but it was our sin and his love. The only reason all that suffering was necessary was because WE sinned and can't stop sinning. We should be cut to the heart, repent and love Jesus with all our heart. We must be clear that saying we believe and being baptized is not NECESSARILY enough, only we know in our hearts if we TRULY REPENTED.

### DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Read verses 16-21 and 33. How did Peter explain the amazing behavior of the Apostles? How did Peter become such a Bible scholar and so brave (look at Luke 24:45 and John 14:26)? <u>What happens when you receive the Holy Spirit?</u>
- Amazingly, Peter the simple fisherman began to quote from Joel 2:28-32. In it, beginning in verse 12 God tells the people to repent and rend their hearts then, beginning in verse 18, God said he would have mercy on them and never again would they be shamed. Beginning in verse 28 he then says that after that time he would pour out his Spirit on all people. The coming of Jesus is God's mercy and great blessing. We can accept Jesus when we repent and rend our hearts. The outpouring of the Holy Spirit was a new thing in God's history. There were people filled with the Spirit of God in the OT, like Saul for a time, Elijah, Elisha (who asked for a double portion of the Spirit). But for it to be poured out forever on all people is something new. John the Baptist had told the people again and again that the Messiah would baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire but they had never really believed or understood this.
- Before Jesus had ascended, he breathed on them, that is the giving of the Spirit and it says that he opened their minds to understand all the scriptures. Even later on, the Pharisees took note that these were uneducated blue collar men, even they could not explain this sudden change. The sudden change is the greatest proof of the resurrection of Jesus and the new life through the Spirit in Jesus.
- You are changed. Your heart becomes sensitive to sin. God gives you direction and inspiration in prayer. You have words to speak, courage to tell others, and power to do God's work.

- 2. Read verses 22-23. Who is responsible for the death of Jesus? Why must we take personal responsibility? Read verse 24. How did God show his power and love to Jesus? Why did Jesus die? Why did God raise him to life?
- We are. Those who sin, is the entire human race. Directly the Pharisees were responsible, but all those who allowed it to happen are also responsible.

- God raised him from the dead.
- Jesus died to save us from our sins.
- · Jesus was raised to give us victory over death and prove that he was the Messiah.
- 3. Read verses 32-33. Where is Jesus now? Read verses 36-37. How did the people respond?
- · Exalted to the right hand of God
- The people realized that they had killed the Messiah, the author of life, the son of God who is now exalted to the right hand of God. Surely, they realized that they were both judged at this moment and were terrified and also sorry and repented. It says they were cut to the heart and asked "Brothers, what shall we do?"
- 4. Read verse 38. What must we and all sinners, who crucified Jesus by our sins, do to be saved? Read verse 40. Why must we separate ourselves from the sinful world to be saved? Read verse 41. How many were saved that day? *What is your response to Peter's message?*
- · We must first of all repent. That doesn't just mean say "I'm sorry" but actually turn your life away from those things and never do them again. In this same way we must be baptized. This is similar to John's baptism but not the same. It is a symbol of putting the old self to death and rising with Christ. Christian baptism isn't just repentance like John's baptism but accepting Jesus as my Lord and Savior and deciding to live a new life in him.
- Repentance must be sincere. Some think they are saved but their life shows no evidence of it. To be saved, we must actually separate ourselves from the sinful world.

When we do things in the name of Jesus, God is with us. Let's learn today how to do everything in the name of Jesus, and be used to do great things for God!

Read verse 1. Where were Peter and John going? What kind of jobs did Peter and John have before they started following Jesus? How had their lives changed?
Read verse 2-3. Who was being carried to the temple gate called Beautiful? What did he ask for from Peter and John? How could silver and gold help this beggar?
Read verses 4-5. What did the man expect from Peter and John? Read verses 6-7. What did Peter give him instead? Why is Jesus a far better gift?
Read verse 8. What happened to the man? Read verses 9-10. How did the people who saw the crippled man walking respond?

Application: How can you give others the name of Jesus this week?

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Read verse 1. Where were Peter and John going? <u>What kind of jobs did Peter and John have before</u> they started following Jesus? How had their lives changed?

Peter and John were going up to the temple at the time of prayer.

Peter and John were fishermen but they were no longer working for food that spoils but for the food that endures to eternal life (Jn 6:27-29). They were no longer interested in making money but they wanted to live for God and his good purpose. Of course we need to make money, we need to go to school, we need to get into a good college and get a good career but when it is time to seek God, we need to give him priority.

Read verse 2-3. Who was being carried to the temple gate called Beautiful? What did he ask for from Peter and John? *How could silver and gold help this beggar?* 

A man who was lame from birth was being carried to the gate.

He asked them for money

For that day or the next maybe he could eat. It seems that to eat is the number one pressing need of all people we think that what we really need to worry about is getting money to eat and live.

Read verses 4-5. What did the man expect from Peter and John? Read verses 6-7. What did Peter give him instead? Why is Jesus a far better gift?

He gave them his attention expecting to get some money

Silver and gold we don't have but what we do have we give you in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth be healed.

Jesus helps us for our whole life not just for the day. Eternal life is far more important than food.

Read verse 8. What happened to the man? Read verses 9-10. How did the people who saw the crippled man walking respond? *How can you give others the name of Jesus this week?* 

He was immediately healed he jumped to his feet and started jumping and praising God.

They were filled with wonder and amazement

Peter spoke to them and explained how Jesus had given him the power to heal the man. God's plan was to save all people from the power of sin through Jesus starting with the Jews in Jerusalem. (Acts 1:8)

When they healed him, many people were moved to follow Jesus. However, the religious leaders did not like it. They persecuted Peter and John, and threatened them. Peter and John, filled with the Holy Spirit were not afraid. When we have the Holy Spirit, no one can and intimidate us and we can keep on doing God's work.

Read verses 1-3. How were Peter and John persecuted for their faith in Jesus? Read verse 4. What effect
did that persecution have on the people?
Read Verses 5-7. Why did the religious leaders want to stop the Christian ministry that was growing?  Why do people want to stop Christians today?
Read verses 8. How did Peter receive courage and wisdom to respond under such pressure? Why wasn't he scared or confused (see also Matthew 10:18-20)? What can we do when we are challenged of persecuted?
Read verses 10-12. What did the Holy Spirit teach about Jesus? Read verse 13 and What did the religious leaders realize? Read verses 18-22. Why couldn't they do anything?

- 5. You're in the middle of an intense video game. Just a few more points and you'll beat your high score. You hear Dad say it's time to turn off the game. The game's loud, so it would be easy to pretend you didn't hear. That way, you could finish the game. What will you do?

Despite this, he was not fearful. He knew God was with him and continued to preach about Jesus. God miraculously saved him every time someone wanted to kill him. God wanted to use Saul for a great mission to preach the gospel to the Gentiles of his time.

What did Saul do after 'several days' in Damascus (19b-20)? Why were those who listened to him so surprised (21)?
Read verse 22. How powerful was his teaching? How could he do this after only several days (Read Galatians 1:11-17)? What was the result of his powerful teaching (23)? How did he escape (24-25)?
Why was it hard for the Christians in Jerusalem to accept Saul (26)? Who helped him (27)? What do you know about Barnabas (see 4:36,37)?
Who did Saul stay with and what did he do while he was in Jerusalem (28-29; Read Galatians 1:18-19)? Why did they again try to kill him? How did the believers help him (30)?
How does Paul immediate conversion and powerful preaching challenge us? Where does the knowledge and authority to teach about Jesus come from?

Application: Are you on fire to tell others about Jesus? Why or Why not? How can you be?

- ❖ The purpose of this Bible study is to help them see the amazing total transformation of Paul's life immediately after accepting Christ. Many people take years to overcome doubts and fears and tell even one person about Jesus—some never do. Paul preached the next day, powerfully! Not only that but he 'PROVED that Jesus is the Son of God. That kind of knowledge and courage does not come from man or from more Bible study but as Paul reveals in Galatians, from the Holy Spirit.
- ❖ It should be noted that between verses 22 and 23 Paul spends 3 years in Arabia, presumably praying and meditating on who Jesus is and preparing himself to teach about him. This is where Paul does take time to prepare himself and learn. Just as Jesus' disciples were trained for 3 years and then sent out, so also Paul was trained by the Holy Spirit for 3 years and then we see that his preaching upon returning was so powerful that they wanted to kill him and he had to be snuck out of the city because he shook Satan's stronghold there so powerfully.
- Our kids think they cannot tell anyone about Jesus, that somehow they are lacking and it will take many years before they can really do anything for Jesus and so they hide. However, after just several days Paul was so amazed by the grace of Jesus and his calling that he couldn't wait. Then as a good Bible student he learned more, but he never stopped preaching and serving Christ. May we all learn to overcome fear (and excuses) and go out in response to the grace we received. It is God who gives us the words and the authority.

### god guides peter and cornelius

Were you ever challenged to make friends with someone different from you? Why is it hard to make friends with different people who are not like us or from our country? Why is it good to do so?

God wanted to spread the gospel to all kinds of people. He wanted to use Peter his faithful disciple for this work. Peter however had grown up as a law-abiding Jew. There were certain people and certain customs he could not accept. In this passage we learn how God helped Peter to overcome his prejudices so that he could be used by God. God used Cornelius a God fearing man to help Peter. Cornelius was not a Jew but he feared and trusted God, so God could bless him and use him in his salvation work? As we study this passage think about what kind of prejudices you have.

# How did God work through Peter as he traveled about the country (9:32-43)? Who was Cornelius and why did God want to bless him (1-4)? What did the angel tell him to do (5-8)? In the meantime, how did God speak to Peter and what was his reaction (9-14)? What was God's word to him (15-16)? What was the meaning of the vision and how did God want him to apply it (17-20)? How did Peter receive the men (21-23a)? What amazing thing does this show about Peter? What does God want you to do? How did Cornelius greet Peter (23b-25)? How did Peter share his inner struggle and his reason for coming without objection (26-29)? Through Cornelius' and Peter's words what do we learn about the Gospel and who can receive God's grace (30-43)? What happened after Peter finished preaching (44-48)? How did this event open the door to Gentile ministry?

Application: What kind of prejudices do you need to give up to spread the gospel to all people?

ave you ever tried to talk to or make friends with someone very different from you? Maybe a refugee or someone from a completely different background? What was it like? How did it affect your perspective?

In this passage we learn how God helped the Jews in Jerusalem to accept the new Gentile believers through Peter's testimony. God began to work greatly among the Gentiles after this and the church grew to include people outside of Jerusalem. Today let's think about how the gospel touches the hearts of all kinds of people and changes them into children of God. God's love knows no boundaries.

# What did the Apostles and believers in Judea hear and why was it a big deal (1)? How did some of them criticize Peter (2-3)? How did Peter respond to the criticism (4-14)? What did God teach Peter and them about the new work he was doing (15-17)? How did the Jewish believers respond (18)? What do you learn from them about accepting God's way of working when it is hard to understand? At the same time, who did God also begin working through and what happened (19-21)? What does this tell you about the work of God? Who did the church of Jerusalem send to Antioch (22)? What did Barnabas see when he got to Antioch (23)? Why was Barnabas the perfect person for this mission (24)? Where did Barnabas go and why (25-26)? How powerful was their ministry in Antioch (26b)? What did prophets from Jerusalem predict (27-28)? How did the believers in Antioch respond to his message (29-30)? What effect do you think this Gentile offering had on those Jews who could not accept the Gentile ministry? What can you learn from these new Christians in Antioch?

Application: How do you see God working in our times and how can you be part of telling the good news?

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Acts 11:1-30 Key Verse: 11:18

- ❖ When Barnabas went to look for Saul in Tarsus, it seems to have been many years (estimates between 8-12 years). 11:30 Paul went a second time to Jerusalem. Paul says that this second visit to Jerusalem took place after 14 years (Gal 2:1). Paul upon his conversion spent 3 years in Arabia (Gal 1:17) and then returned to Damascus, where he escaped a plot by the Jews and went to Jerusalem to meet Peter (Gal 1:18). There he begins preaching but they try to kill him and so he has to flee to Tarsus (Acts 9:28-30; Gal 1:21). Then 14 years until his second visit to Jerusalem means he spent 3 years in Damascus, and when Barnabas called him to minister with him in Antioch for 1 year, that leaves 10 years in Tarsus.
  - The other view is that in ancient reckoning even part of a year is counted as a year so not 14 full years but 2 part years and 12 full years. This means 1½ years, possibly, in Damascus, "a whole year" (Acts 11:26) in Antioch, so possibly 8-9 years in Tarsus). Yet a third view is that "14 years" refers to AFTER Damascus which means his visit to Jerusalem is the Jerusalem Council in Acts 15, which means he was only in Tarsus for maybe 5 years.
  - O Possibly in this time in Tarsus, he did ministry in Cilicia and Syria. There are some possible clues in Gal 1:21-2:2 where he doesn't say he returned to Tarsus after his first Jerusalem visit but says that he returned to "Syria and Cilicia" (Cilicia is where Tarsus is located and Syria is where Antioch is located). When he and Barnabas had a sharp disagreement about John Mark, Barnabas sailed for Cyprus while Paul went to the churches in Syria and Cilicia. In Syria at least we know was the Antioch church but we have no record of anyone establishing churches in Cilicia which is Paul's home region—it makes logical sense that he would have established churches there and this is also why Barnabas sought him out for the work in Antioch since he was known in that area.
  - Regardless of how we count the timeline, Paul definitely had a long time to study and do local ministry before God called him to a much bigger mission and that should communicate to our children. Start locally where you are, not waiting for some grand vision of being called to a far off land to do some great ministry. Practically, if God did that, they wouldn't be ready for it intellectually, spiritually, practically, or disciplined enough. Those who are seeking God and working where they are will be called by him to a greater work. We each may have some very clear calling from God, but in the meantime do the work right in front of you where you are, because there is such great need and the workers are few. What's more God seems to have called him from doing work by himself to working with others and from this time on he never does ministry work alone. Coworking with Barnabas seems to leave a strong impression on Paul and he learns that God's work must be done in fellowship.

God was with them and they experienced answer to their prayer. Do you pray for others? Do you believe that God can change an impossible situation when his people pray?

What did King Herod do to some church members (1-4)? Why? What were the believers doing while Peter was in prison (5)? <u>Do you remember a situation in your life that you had to pray urgently like this?</u>
What was Peter doing the night before his execution (6-7)? How did God help Peter to get out of prison (8-10)?
Where did Peter go when he realized what was happening (11-12)? Even though they were praying for Peter, what did the believers think when he came to the door (13-17)?
What did Herod do to the guards who lost Peter (18-19a)? What finally happened to Herod in the en (19b-23)? In spite of persecution what happened to the church (24-25)?

Application: After experiencing the power of prayer for the persecuted, how can we pray for the Persecuted Church?

Later the church at Jerusalem sent Barnabas to help establish this church and it began to grow. Barnabas invited Saul to help him in this ministry. Now God wanted to use the Antioch church to spread the gospel. Barnabas and Saul were chosen to go out as missionaries. This was the first of Paul mission journeys.



- Often kids think that to be a shepherd or missionary, to give their life to God and tell their friends and classmates about Jesus, is way too difficult, like a heavy burden. What we need to focus this study on, is that they were "set apart". How awesome it is to be chosen, to be the number one pick, to have a purpose, to be wanted. The kids know what it is like to be chosen first and what is like to be chosen last or even passed over. To be chosen by God to do his mission is such a privilege not a burden.
- They went to Cyprus first, but not of their own idea, this was the leading of the Holy Spirit. Barnabas was from Cypress. How interesting that the first place that God led them was to familiar territory, to a place they could feel comfortable (because there was a large Jewish population in Cypress) and start their missionary journey easy moving to more difficult. God is very gracious and leads us in the way that is fitting to us. Following God is not super-difficult and painful, he knows us and he knows how to help us and lead us in the best way. It won't always be easy but it will be exactly what is best for us and where we can be most fruitful.
- ❖ When they were opposed by an evil person, Bar-Jesus/Elymas, they did not love and forgive him. They—like Jesus speaking to the Pharisees—rebuked him and opposed him. There is a time to play nice, and there is a time to tell the truth and rebuke. Rebuking should be done carefully and sparingly, but when a person is set on doing evil and opposing God we don't turn the other cheek and let him blaspheme God's name, we must have the courage to stand up to them and oppose them. Too often Christians have just rolled over and given up before atheists, anti-Christian groups, gay rights activists, school boards, Muslims, and the list goes on. They say they are trying to live quiet lives and respect the authorities but in fact they are being cowardly instead of standing up for the name of Jesus. Just as we would not let our children or spouse be made fun of or slandered, we should stand up for the name of Jesus with just as much passion. We should not allow our country to be taken over by the devil and his servants, just so we can be "nice".

In this passage Paul travels on to Perga in Pamphylia and then to Pisidian Antioch. In Pisidian Antioch Paul gives his first missionary message to the Jews who lived there. When many Jews rejected his message he turned to the Gentiles. God loves all people and he was using Paul and Barnabas to spread the gospel beyond the territory of the Jews.

Paul and Barnabas had experienced God's power as they spoke about salvation in Jesus in many places. Many Jews and especially Gentiles believed in all the cities where they had preached. When they got back to Antioch they spent a long time with the disciples. In today's passage we learn how God led Paul and Barnabas to Jerusalem to a very important meeting about how to include the new Gentile believers in the church.

Application: Is there anyone that you have a hard time to believe they could be saved, how can you overcome your prejudices and pray for all people?

- From chapter 11:2 this problem has been floating around the church. The circumcision group was a group of Christians who believed that you had to be Jewish, that is keep ALL the law of Moses (the 10 commandments plus the very long detailed laws in Leviticus), in order to be a true Christian. It was a very appropriate question, and one which was not really clear. Jesus restricted his ministry to the Jews during his life but yet he always welcomed Gentiles without discriminating (with the exception of the Syro-Phoenician woman). Yet Jesus never really told his disciples what were the clear rules concerning Old Testament Law. It took a long time before people really worked out that they had accepted a New Covenant that cancelled the old (see Hebrews). Paul and Barnabas and later Peter really looked at how the Holy Spirit had been moving and saw that God accepted people on the basis of grace and not on outward law. This doesn't mean that we should ignore the Old Testament and ignore all the rules, the rules actually reveal what God loves and hates and that is always good and appropriate to do, but outward laws like circumcision are part of becoming Jewish—the keeping of festivals, offering of sacrifices, ritual tithes and all such outward things were canceled through the fulfillment of the Old Testament because they were an outward way of being righteous that was no longer relevant because we find salvation only in Jesus.
- The believers of the group of the Pharisees seem to be the same as the circumcision group in 11:2 and perhaps Galatians 2:12. They couldn't let go of the old way and all the work they had done to be made righteous. Many Christians also hold onto legalism as

a blanket to make themselves feel better, "I kept all the rules I'm a good Christian...I'm better than that guy..." It is interesting that there were people who had become Christians that were still Pharisees. There were many kinds of people in the church with many different beliefs and ways of living and doing, there wasn't just one way to be a Christian. In the same way becoming a Christian doesn't mean that we give up who we are and just become like everyone else. The church is made up of many different kinds of people and that is great.

- ❖ When we fully understand grace we understand that it is crazy: we are saved only by faith in Jesus, we don't have to keep rules. In this way it is only by grace that we are saved and each person equally. It is not only some who can be saved because they are good enough and others cannot be saved because they are "bad people". We are not better than others because we are Christians but every person is equal because we are each saved by grace. Then we can't be proud or exclude others but must serve and love each person equally.
- ❖ We also learn that not every issue is easy and has a simple answer, some things require us to discuss and pray and find God's direction. We need to learn to work together and find God's wisdom together. Especially, we must seek to find the leading of God's Holy Spirit and once we've found an answer each submit our strong idea to follow God's idea. It is very significant that James is the one who said this, because James was the most legalistic of the Jewish Christians and least likely to accept this direction but he saw that God's leading was undeniable and so he submitted his strong idea to God's and found God's direction, thank God.

DISCUSSION OURSTIONS

#### PAUL BEGINS HIS SECOND JOURNEY

"After Paul had seen the vision, we got ready at once to leave for Macedonia, concluding that God had called us to preach the gospel to them."

Acts 16:1-10 Key Verse 6:10

What do you like to do with your friends? What is the most fun you ever had with your friends? Why do you like to spend time with them? How does it make you feel?

Paul decided to visit all the brothers and sisters in all the towns where he had preached so he set off on his second missionary journey, this time with a new co-worker Silas. In Lystra he met Timothy a young man and invited him to travel with him. Paul carefully followed the leading of the Holy Spirit. This led him to the west to Macedonia to a new mission field.



Where and why did Paul and his group continue to on their journey (6)? Where did they try to go (7) What city did they finally stop in (8)? How far is it from Pisidian Antioch to Troas (look at map)? Think about how Paul and his companions traveled following the Holy Spirit (7).
Who did Paul see in a vision (9)? Where is Macedonia (look on a map)? What did Paul decide to do afte having this vision (10)?
What do you learn in this passage about how God called even a young man like Timothy to be Paul's helper on his mission journey?. What do you learn about following God's leading?

Application: How can you seek the Spirit's leading in finding those you should share the good news with?

ave you ever had the courage to share your faith with someone or tell them about the Bible? How did it go? How did you feel? Did you do it again?

Paul had a vision that pointed him to go to Macedonia. So instead of going north he went west to Philippi. There he met several people who believed his message very personally. He and Silas also were arrested and put in prison, but God helped them to get out and they continued on their mission journey.

Trace Paul's route to Philippi (11-12). What kind of city was Philippi (12)? What did they do when they
arrived (13)? How did one woman become a believer (14)? How did she reveal her changed life (15)?
How did Paul help one slave girl (16-18)? What did the owners of the slave girl do to Paul and Silas (19-24)? How do you think they felt?
What did Paul and Silas do in prison (25)? Why? What did God do and what effect did it have on the jailer (26-30)?
How were the jailer and his family saved (31-32)? How did the jailer reveal his changed life (33-34)?
How did Paul and Silas turn this persecution into a victory (35-39)? How did they encourage the church at Lydia's house (40)? What do we learn in this passage about preaching the gospel?

Application: Can you trust in God's ability to work in the hearts of those around you? Do you have the faith and courage to speak the good news?
